

## MISCELLANEOUS

- A. Attendance--YES! Class lectures will be a primary source for learning the material. We can also learn from each other's background and spirit and from the questions and answers given in class. More than one unexcused absence will affect your grade. Rectifying records of tardies or unexcused absences is the student's responsibility.
- B. Pop Quizzes--possible, but probably not IF the class members are prepared each class period and keep up with the reading assignments.
- C. Exams, Scheduled Quizzes--these five quizzes will consist of about 20 objective questions (matching, multiple choice, etc.) covering the assigned chapters and relevant lecture material. FINAL--this exam will consist of 12-20 review questions taken off of the first four quizzes and two essay questions taken from an essay questions list.
- D. Written assignments--
1. Chapter Essay: Take a chapter of Isaiah and: a) outline it according to main ideas and sub-topics (limit of one page) and then b) add a 2 page essay of your ideas and evaluation about the chapter, highlighting one central point. Length--3 typewritten pages. Maximum points possible = 50. Due date: \*see CLASS SCHEDULE\*
  2. "Teaching Isaiah" Lecture Notes: As you study Isaiah and his writings: a) select a single chapter you would like to study in more depth; OR an historical problem or situation; OR a doctrine which Isaiah emphasized; OR some other topic dealing with Isaiah, and b) Research that chapter, problem, doctrine or topic using scholarly commentaries (both LDS and non-LDS) and other Bible resource aides (including LDS Bible Topical Guide) in order to better understand various insights and viewpoints concerning that topic. Some Isaiah commentaries will be in the Reserve Library--look under Brother Ludlow's name in the Reserve Library card catalogue index. Other excellent resources will be in the Religion Reference area (4th level) and in the stacks. If a given book in the stacks has only a few pages on your topic, xerox those pages and leave the book in the library for others to use! Then, c) Organize your notes and add your own ideas and insights to prepare the material into a 30-minute lecture or talk about that topic which you could give to this class. If helpful, you could include your own outline of the chapter, other translations (even your own) of pertinent verses, examples or references from other parts of Isaiah (or other scriptures) or anything else you think would be helpful. Finally, d) Type the material into a short paper, 5-8 pages long, double-spaced. Be sure your paper has an appropriate title, stated teaching audience and objective, organized flow of ideas, and solid conclusion. Include footnote references (either on page bottom or at end of paper) to the ideas you gained from others. Include a bibliography of the resources you used! Do your best job and include charts, diagrams, illustrations, xeroxed materials, stories or anything else which will be used while teaching the topic. Indicate through this paper both what you have learned and how you would teach it. Maximum points possible = 100. Due date: \*\*see CLASS SCHEDULE\*\*

NOTICE: Late assignments, sloppy style, poor spelling, etc., will negatively affect the scores of these papers. Do your best job and don't be afraid to be creative and original.
